Views From a Hill

A Reflection on Galatians 6:9

"Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up." — Galatians 6:9

Some of the most beautiful gardens will never bloom—because someone stopped watering before the harvest. We live in a world which applauds results more than resilience. Where it's easier to celebrate success stories than those of quiet endurance—the daily faithfulness that keeps showing up even when the fruit isn't visible yet. You can pour your heart into your marriage, your ministry, your job, your parenting—and still wonder, "Is this even working?" Maybe you've prayed for years for someone to return to faith, and nothing seems to change. Maybe you've been doing the right thing, and no one seems to notice. It's easy to get tired. It's easy to want to quit. That's why Galatians 6:9 is such a lifeline. Paul's words speak right into that weary space in our souls: "At the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up."

God is working beneath the surface. When we're tempted to stop doing good, God is still doing something beneath the surface. Paul's encouragement isn't just motivational—it's a promise. A harvest is coming, but only if we keep sowing. The phrase "at the proper time" reminds us that God's timing isn't our timing. I don't know about you, but I like instant harvests—same-day delivery! It's helpful to remember God often works on seed time before harvest time. The phrase "do not give up" in the original Greek means "don't loosen your grip," so don't let go of the plow! Paul isn't calling us to burnout—he's calling us to endurance. There's a difference. Also, weary doesn't mean weak—it means human. And God meets us in that weariness to whisper, "Keep going. I'm not done yet."

What does it look like to keep going? Maybe this week, it's simply doing one good thing you feel like quitting on. Pray one more time. If you're tired of praying for a wandering child, a struggling marriage, or an unchanging heart—pray again tonight before you sleep. Show up one more time. If you're weary from serving, teaching, or carrying others' burdens—walk into that room again. God is already there, ready to use you. Obey one more time. If doing good feels unnoticed, forgive again, act with integrity again, love again. Believe one more time. When hope feels far away, remind yourself that God's timing has never failed and His harvest never comes up empty. You don't have to do everything. Just don't stop doing good.

Why this Matters. Every act of goodness is a seed—and seeds don't show life right away. If we keep sowing kindness, faithfulness, integrity, and love, God promises a harvest. If we stay faithful, God will bring joy, growth, and Kingdom impact. So when you feel tired, remember: Don't give up. God will bring the harvest. Even when it's slow, unseen, or lonely—keep planting the good God has placed in your hands. Because when the season shifts and the harvest comes, you'll see that every quiet act of faithfulness was worth it. Stay in the field - the harvest is on its way!

Pastoral care is about building and nurturing our relationships with one another. When people are hurting, they need someone who cares about them and the ones they love, and the same is true when they are rejoicing. Let's remember that pastoral care is not a role or a job for one

person but is a congregational outpouring of compassion and love. We are all called to this. Maybe you're not going to lead a funeral or officiate a wedding, but you are called to pour out love to your church family in times of weeping and in times of rejoicing.

One of the amazing things we can rejoice about together is the May 2025 graduation of PCFS member Scott Stolte from Pittsburgh Theological Seminary with a Master of Divinity degree, and his first call as a pastor to the Lamington Presbyterian Church in Bedminster, NJ. At the same time, Laura was hired as the Program Coordinator in the Office of Academic Success in the Rutgers Health School of Nursing. Scott started his new role in early September and will be ordained and installed in the afternoon on Sunday, November 23rd at the Lamington church. It is an understatement to say that Scott's mom, Vicki Kaye, and Laura's parents, John & Linda Fisher are proud of their kids! We are proud of them, too!

In Scott's statement of faith he wrote, "I believe that all of us, as believers, are interdependent on one another. We are to support and be accountable to one another while awaiting the glorious return of our Lord." Amen to that.

8 AM Contemplative Service – Remaining in the Chapel

What began as a temporary change last winter—when heating issues in the Sanctuary moved our early service to the Chapel—has blossomed into something special. Those who worshipped at 8 AM quickly discovered how beautifully the Chapel complements the quiet, reflective nature of our Contemplative Service.

After a summer of prayerful evaluation and gathering feedback, the Worship Committee met in October and **voted to make the Chapel the ongoing home of our 8 AM Contemplative Service**. The vast majority of attendees shared their appreciation for the Chapel's intimate setting and sacred atmosphere.

A few practical concerns have also been addressed. **Sound reinforcement** has been improved with the addition of a discreet speaker, which will soon be integrated into a **custom-designed pulpit**. For **winter weather**, particularly the slope of the sidewalk, worshippers are encouraged to **park in the FLC lot and enter through the Food Pantry entrance**. The committee is also exploring the **addition of a handrail** along the sidewalk for added safety.

We're grateful for how God continues to guide our worship life together. With three unique worship experiences each Sunday—Contemplative in the Chapel, Traditional in the Sanctuary, and Contemporary in the Family Life Center—our church family is blessed to encounter God's presence in diverse and meaningful ways across our beautiful campus.



YOUTH MINISTRY


November Update:






Women's Thank Offering Service


Waiting for our Soup Sale?

SESSION UPDATE

Session met on Monday, October 6, with Pastor Ed Blank moderating the meeting.

- 1. Session approved the following:
 - Our Congregational Meeting will be held on Sunday, December 7 for the purpose of electing Elders, Deacons, and Trustees.
 - The 2026 Per Capita will be \$34.66 per member. The breakdown is as follows:
 - General Assembly \$11.26
 - Synod of the Trinity \$2.40
 - Presbytery of Carlisle \$21.00
 - . Envelopes and opportunities to make this payment will be available this spring.
 - *If your adult children have moved away, or no longer attend PCFS and wish to be removed from the church rolls, please let the office know.
 - Session and trustees are working to determine the best course of action for the manse in preparation for a new pastor. Several options are being explored and will be shared with the congregation.
- 2. Opportunities through the Carlisle Presbytery:
 - Ruling and Resting Elders are invited to participate in Communion Training to be held April 11 at Highland United in Newport.

Two levels of trainings will be offered:

Elder Communion Training 101 – is for elders who would like to be trained, or trained elders who would like a refresher training.

Elder Communion Training 201 – is for elders who are at the end of their 3rd year of certification and need recertified.

Classes are limited to 20 persons each.

- Two Ruling or Resting Elders are needed to be commissioned for the 2026 General Assembly. The GA is in Milwaukee and will run from June 28 to July 3. If selected, you will need to attend a few committee meetings prior to the GA. The presbytery will pay for all expenses. The deadline to submit names to the presbytery is November 14. They will select elders at their November 19 meeting and submit names to the Synod.
- Boundary Training for staff, elders, and deacons will take place in 2026. Although this training is mandatory for the groups mentioned, it is also available to anyone in the congregation. The training will be offered both in-person and via video.
- * Please contact Cheri Kearney if you are interested in either of these opportunities.
- 3. We are still looking for someone to oversee the Safety and Shepherds committee.
- * If you feel called to lead this committee, please contact Chris Stover or Cheri Kearney.
